

Read Out Loud 2019:

Vampires Don't Wear Polka Dots

In this, the 10th annual Read Out Loud, we invited Debbie Dadey. She has published 166 books and sold over 43 million copies of her books. We decided to feature *Vampires Don't Wear Polka Dots*, the first book in her very popular series, *The Bailey School Kids*.

<u>23</u> schools in both District 60 and 70 participated by reading *Vampires Don't Wear Polka Dots* to 77 classrooms, totally <u>1,681</u> students.

Over the course of the two day event, 1,591 students and teachers attended one of six sessions at Rawlings Library to hear our author. Ms. Dadey shared with the classes how she became a writer.

In-class Workshops

This year, classes could request an in-class workshop on creating your own graphic novel, led by PCCLD staff. 3 classes took advantage of this option, which reached a total of 45 students. The students were very excited to see the fun activities that they could partake on Ms. Dadeys website. They created some beautiful story maps. The teachers enjoyed having the workshop has an addition to the presentation.



We collected feedback from teachers after the visit to see what they thought, and 25 of 71 responded. Here are the results:


This program got my students excited about reading.
